VILLAGE MEMOIRES of HELEN TUSTAIN Part 2

The Swalcliffe Archive has collected a number of interviews with village residents, some as sound recordings and some as simple transcripts of what was said. In this piece we present the second of two articles based on two interviews with Helen Tustain. Last month's article described part of the first interview recorded in 1978. Here we continue with that interview and add further material from the second interview recorded by the broadcaster Giles Woodforde for BBC Radio Oxford. It was broadcast on 4th December 1988 in the BBC Oxford radio series "People and Places". Giles lived in Swalcliffe Vicarage (now Church House) Swalcliffe from 1954 to 1959 with his father the Revd Dr Christopher Woodforde.

Both interviews took place at Helen's home at No 1 The Bank. In 1988 Giles opened the interview describing Helen as an old friend and commenting on an interesting tea towel, full of old sepia photographs, that Helen was holding. One of the views showed the village pub and a large farmhouse behind it. Giles asked if the pub was still there. Helen replied "Yes, the Stags Head... and that's the farmhouse where I was born, my grandparents lived there."

The photo referred to [FN1] is reproduced on the cover of this issue of The Link. Taken in the late 1920s, it shows an early motor delivery lorry, behind it are a pony and trap and three men. Beyond is the farmhouse of Street Farm, now named Sparrow Hall, where Helen was born. Outside the pub is a "British Petroleum" sign advertising the sale of petrol by the landlord Charles Blower.

Helen went on to describe the scene. "We don't know whether it was a bread van, we're not sure about that, but as I say that my father (Thomas Harold Ashby) is with the pony and trap there and there is Ross Gilkes at the back and Arthur Nichols there looks as if he was mending a hole in the road." There were very few motor vehicles on the local roads at that time, so this delivery lorry would have been amongst the first."...very few cars, but I should think two families probably had a car, and we just depended on the Midland Red bus and the Tanners' bus service." It was safe and common for children to play out in the road "... yes, you could run about anywhere... only bicycles or motorbikes".

Giles spotted another interesting photo on the tea towel, "...here is a lovely cottage here thatched cottage or two cottages with another piece of mechanical modernity, a motorcycle and sidecar by the look of it? The photo [FN2] shows Manor Cottage, again in the late 1920s, looking towards the barn.. Helen replied "Yes, that's outside the cottage that's no longer there... it's now part of the garage of Lime Tree house. Just beyond it is Manor Cottage "....where Mrs. Timms used to live in our little village shop. And I think she was the first of the telephone messages come through 'cause it was a post office as well. And next, the Eeleys live there. It was a blacksmith shop.

Giles referred again to the first photo (on the cover of this issue), commenting that just beyond, out of view was somewhere that Helen knew very well as the final resting place of the manual telephone exchange [FN3] in which she worked. Ray was interested to know when the first telephones came to Swalcliffe. "Well, I think before the First World War, at the little general

stores (Manor Cottage) there was a sort of telephone apparatus, very antique sort of thing; and then they also had telegrams there – but they would probably be sent over from Banbury."

The first real telephone exchange came later... "there was one at the Post Office at Mrs Stretton's at the bottom of the hill possibly round about 1926 or 1927. There was a small manual board and that continued until they gave it all up in 1942, and then it moved up to where the old bakehouse is now [FN3] where they used to keep the flour for the bread. The Post Office leased that building from a Mr Griffin of Epwell. And then they installed more modern equipment. Ethel Newport was working there with her sister, Mrs Sybil Carter. Ethel was there for 22 years and I went there about 1958 as a temporary telephonist just to do the relief duties and when Phyllis Gubbins the other telephonist left to start up a little shop they asked me to take on full time after the summer of 1960. It closed down in 1964"

The telephone exchange had to work twenty four hours a day, so the staff operated a shift system. "We did this sort of staggered shift. We went on at 9, till 4 in the afternoon and then we went, the next shift went on at 4, should have been till 10 but it went on through the night but that had all been changed before I went there to work, and then you came off at 9 that morning. Then the next week you didn't have to go to work at all, so it was like working two weeks in three. There was a single bed there and you were able to draw the bed across to the switchboard and switch on the alarm, and you gotta test that alarm and be sure as it was ringing, and if it didn't ring you gotta report it through to the engineers. It was a very loud bell." Occasionally calls did come through in the night "... just sometimes it could have been two or three times in the night. This is for doctors and for fires. And when there was storms it would give a sort of tinkle, it would keep ringing I mean, and that was false alarm... you had to get up and investigate what was happening". Occasionally the engineer had to be called out..."I once had to get one over from Chipping Norton just after midnight.... I had gone to bed and had to get dressed again".

But sometimes the alarm did not work, and Helen remembered one strange occurrence... "there was one evening round about midnight.... we have friends of mine that lived at Swalcliffe Mill.... I didn't know it was her at the time, she came up and was knocking on the door and she was covered with a scarf on her head. I looked out of the window and I said to my husband "it doesn't speak"..... anyway when he shouted "what do you want?" this gruff voice, cause she was a deaf lady, and it sort of registered..... she wanted me to phone for the doctor for their son that was taken ill at Swalcliffe Mill. I didn't know what to think, it was really scary being like she was all in these dark clothes.... this scarf on her head. (chuckles).

The operators got used to the familiar voices of the Swalcliffe villagers, but then Sibford was connected to the Swalcliffe exchange "and it was some people who were foreign you see, and sometimes times a job to understand. (laughing)."

Giles wondered if it was the last manual exchange in Oxfordshire, Helen said it was sometimes believed to be the last but thought Kings Sutton and Adderbury were still manual after Swalcliffe went automatic in 1964.

In the 1978 interview Ray Hubbard was interested in transportation and the state of the roads. "Well the roads wouldn't be made up with asphalt until about 1929 so they were just rough roads with pot holes when it was wet, not so wide as the present day....there wasn't a path, that was added with kerbing later after WW2. There was very little traffic, there was only the people at Swalcliffe Park that had a motor car, the rest of the people rode traps and horses and bicycles, quite a few bicycles in the village, and then it came that they had motor bikes and my mother was one that had a motor bike. I think the year was 1928, she had a Royal Enfield."

There was no street lighting (and still none today) "we've only got our own electric lights we've put on our houses". Most houses were still lit then by oil lamps and candles.... "my grandmother lived in this cottage that we're living in now until 1938 and she wouldn't have electricity put in. I think it came to the village about 1930 [FN4] but she would never entertain it; she preferred the lamps and candles and the old fashioned grates".

Transportation originally relied on horse-drawn carriers' carts operated by a number of locals. "there was a carrier in Swalcliffe.... first of all there was Mr George Haines and then his son that I remember took over, Mr Herbert Haines, that lived down Bakers Lane... they went into Banbury on a Thursday and a Saturday and brought back all sorts of things, and took things into the station for people... such as luggage, anything too heavy for them to get otherwise".

During the First World War the Banbury grocer, George Mason, would send a boy out on a bicycle to take orders. The orders would be taken to the Wagon and Horses in Butchers Row, Banbury and the carrier would deliver the orders to Swalcliffe on a Thursday night. "I remember Mr Kite used to come round with the Sunday papers on a Sunday Morning. and the daily papers.... I don't think we had any... not until about the 1930s, a man used to come rounds on a bicycle for a start and then he got a small car, and then the Banbury Guardian, I suppose, was brought out on a carrier's cart."

Eventually two local bus services began operating. "We had two local buses. There was Tanners bus from Sibford and Matthews bus from Brailes, they went in on a Thursday and a Saturday at different times. I think it was 10 o'clock was the first, just before 10 on a Thursday and Tanners bus came about 5 minutes after, going in. Coming out they left the town 12:15 and(the Matthews bus) and one o'clock The Tanners bus, and then they ran again in the

afternoon from Swalcliffe. The Matthews bus was twenty past one and the Tanners bus was twenty to two; and they came out.... Tanner's bus, I think, left at 4 o'clock and the Matthews bus was at 4:15."

In 1919 Midland Red opened their depot in Canal Street, Banbury, and began competing services through Swalcliffe to Shipston. In the Swalcliffe Archive we have a photo of their Tilling-Stephens petrol-electric



coach, registration OH1224 passing Swalcliffe Green in the 1920s. "That came through on a Tuesday, and I believe it went through to Chipping Campden. On a Friday, it came through and connected up to Stratford-on-Avon. Also on Saturday we had Midland Red buses, and on a Sunday afternoon. There was one used to come out from Banbury, get to Swalcliffe at half part two, I think, and that went on to Shipston; and then you changed and got a bus from Shipston to Stratford and there on from Stratford to Birmingham."

"The Tanner's bus was a big... a bus that held about 32 passengers and it was nearly always very full. It was a coach type of bus, but not like we see today. And the Matthews bus was on a similar line; and the Midland red, well, they probably held about 40 passengers. The main railway station was Banbury, but there was also one at Hook Norton and that linked up into Chipping Norton line.... it wasn't much used by Swalcliffe people."

"The doctor used to live at Sibford Ferris. There was a Dr Race, I think he was present at my birth. And then followed him was Dr Mottram; and Dr Taylor followed him, him and his wife, and then they moved into Burdrop where Dr Agnew lives today. I don't think many people could afford to have the doctor. They relied on neighbours helping and anyone that sort of had a bit of medical know-how, you know, to treat them. Dr Race that brought me into the world might have come up on a horse but, latterly, the doctors I remember had motor cars. Then the district nurses... at one time one lived at Swalcliffe, but she used to come round in an Austin Seven car. But before that, I do remember the nurses coming round on bicycles to attend to the sick, and anyone that was having a baby to be there when they were brought into this world. And when people were dying, sometimes they were present. And sometimes they would come and knock for my mother and say someone was ill, and she would go and sit up with them at night, and nearly always she ended up laying them out. I think there were two more people that could do it in the village. In my time they relied on the District Nurse; and before that probably there were midwives that use to go out and attend to the women, during the First World War, I think, when things were very complicated".


St Nicholas Church








RECIPE FOR JUBILEE TART

Ingredients represents all 4 nations of the UK
England: Cheddar Cheese
Northern Ireland: Potatoes
Scotland: Smoked Salmon
Wales: Leek

Average cost of ingredients per tart, between £3.75 & £5.00 (Will serve 10 People)

- $^*20\,\mathrm{cm}\,(8")\,\mathrm{loose\text{-}bottomed}\,\mathrm{flan}\,\mathrm{tin}$
- *baking beans

Pastry

140 g (5 oz) plain flour

 $35 \,\mathrm{g} \, (1\frac{1}{4} \,\mathrm{oz}) \,\mathrm{margarine}$

 $35 \,\mathrm{g} \, (1^{1/4} \,\mathrm{oz}) \,\mathrm{vegetable} \,\mathrm{fat}$

About 1½ tablespoons cold water

Or use ready-made shortcrust pastry

Filling

 $100 \, \text{g} \, (4 \, \text{oz}) \, \text{Smoked salmon (trimmings or chopped small)}$

 $50 \,\mathrm{g} \, (2 \,\mathrm{oz}) \,\mathrm{leek}$

100g (4 oz) cooked potatoes

70g (2³/₄ oz) Cheddar cheese (grated)

200 ml (7 fl oz) single cream

2 large eggs (beaten)

1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley

Black pepper

1. To make pastry – place flour in bowl add the fats and rub in lightly with fingertips until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.

Add enough cold water to bind to a soft dough, knead briefly and shape into a ball. Wrap and chill for 30 minutes.

- 2. Roll out the pastry and use to line the flan tin. Prick the bottom of the pastry with a fork. Line pastry shell with foil and fill with baking beans. Place tin on a heated baking tray and bake in preheated oven at 200° C Fan (Gas 7) for 10 minutes, remove foil and baking beans, return to the oven for a further 10 minutes.
- 3. Reduce oven temperature to 160°C Fan (Gas 4)
- **4.** Scrub potatoes and place in a pan of lightly salted boiling water to cook for 15 minutes. Drain and allow to cool before

removing the skin and then slicing thinly.

- 5. Finely chop leek. Heat a little butter or oil in a small frying pan, add chopped leek to the pan and cook over a low to moderate heat, stirring occasionally, for about 10 minutes until soft but not coloured allow to cool.
- **6.** Mix together cream, beaten eggs, chopped parsley and plenty of ground black pepper. Layer filling in pastry case;

spread smoked salmon over base of tart followed by cooked leek and then $50\,\mathrm{g}\,(2\,\mathrm{oz})$ grated cheese (keeping remaining

208 ($^{3}4$ oz) to sprinkle on top). Top with thinly sliced cooked potatoes. Sprinkle remaining grated cheese over the top then

gently pour cream and egg mixture in to the tart.

7. Bake in oven for 30 - 35 minutes until filling is set and golden. Serve cold.

NB These quantities also make 18 small tarts using $8 \text{cm} (3 \frac{1}{4})$ plain round cutter and lining patty tins. When making small tarts there is no need to blind bake the cases first.

Bake small tarts at 160° C Fan (Gas 4) for about 30 minutes until filling is set and golden.

Notes from the Editor:

We all know by now that we should not be cutting our hedges, trees and bushes, or taking down drystone walls at these times. We also are aware that we should refrain from pulling Ivy of the walls and be carefull when we are digging in our garden or moving garden "rubbish" or getting hedgestrimmers out. Hedgestrimmers (and to a certain extend even lawnmowers) are a huge danger to many a wild creature (Hedgehogs, Snakes, Newts, Toads and Frogs, Baby birds, and Rabbits). And since the council have brought in charges for the brown bin, we have seen an increase in bonfires, Ideally you have a compost bin instead but if you decide to light a fire please check there is nothing hiding in your bonfire before you light it.

On a lighter note: did you see the Time Team? If not the details and links can be found on page 29. Don't forget that we have got some excellent data and finds from previous digs on display at Swalcliffe Barn; Open on Sundays from 2-5pm until October.

Parties are being planned to celebrate the jubilee, if you can, make a note in your diary and go and support them. A lot of work goes on behind the scenes of local events, and all involved are giving up precious free time to make things happen.

A few more Tadmarton Village hall events have been scheduled in, the kids clubs are well attended and the Sewing in company is proving popular with the ladies, may we remind the gents they are welcome too.

Talking about gents, there is an idea of setting up a men's shed group. This would involve men to bring their projects or ideas and to share hints and tips on how to... Should you be interested in this please let the committee know.
