

SWALCLIFFE BARN Behind the Scenes

It was cleaning day today as the Museum cleaning team prepared Swalcliffe Barn for a new season of public openings. The barn has received a thorough dusting and sweeping. Gone are the dust and cobwebs, the dried



leaves that blew in during the winter and the bat droppings too, though our three species of bat will be waking up soon, so signs of their presence will no doubt return! The kitchen and toilet have also received a deep clean. The historic wagons are still hiding under their dust sheets but the conservation team will be here very soon to uncover them, check them over and give them a careful clean. By the time you read this, the opening of the barn's 2024 season will be upon us.

Our loyal team of volunteer stewards are ready for action, the duty rota has been circulated and we all have our duty dates. Mostly our volunteers need to do only one duty a year, but some have generously agreed to do an extra one to fill this years' rota. This is hugely appreciated, as our volunteer team is currently reduced in size from a one-time high of 70 to this year's 42. The Barn would normally have opened at Easter but, with this smaller team, we have shortened the current open season to twenty five days, May to September for 2024. However, we hope that recruitment will increase our numbers again soon.

Keeping an Ancient Monument safe and saved takes constant effort, with regular inspections leading to occasional repairs. This year the roof has received attention and use of a "cherry picker" has enabled replacement of individual stone slates without the need to clamber all over the roof and dislodge more. Recently another cherry picker was busy inside the barn for an inspection of the roof timbers, most of which are over 600 years old, and this required opening of the big wagon doors the get it in. This provided a rare glimpse through the doors into the farm courtyard of the Rectorial manor as pictured on the front cover of this issue.

In addition to the regular public open days on Sundays from 2pm to 5pm, we can also open the barn at any time for groups of visitors or for community events and special visits. There have been 52 such openings in the last four years. We opened for important community events such as the Swalcliffe village post-pandemic picnic and the Queen's Jubilee, and also for smaller crowds such as local history societies, or Sibford Primary school when they were learning about Romans. We very nearly had four coachloads of Japanese tourists and once, when asked to open for "a group of explorers", we were delighted to welcome a party including Martin and Ranulph Fiennes, whose ancestor William of Wykeham ordered the barn to be built in 1401. We are happy to open for anyone who wants to visit, they just need to ask. Small museums like ours all over the country have experienced slowly reducing visitor numbers for some years, so these

special openings are a good way of enabling more people to enjoy the barn and its contents and we are always looking for new ways to attract visitors.

Outwardly it may sometimes seem that not much happens at the barn, and this became obvious from some comments made during the recent Swalcliffe village survey. The barn is clearly highly valued as a community asset, but many local residents want to see it better used. More and different events centred on the barn would interest people, and these are possible, we just need to make them happen. The events that work best are community-based activities that can be run by a team brought together to make them happen. Anyone can get involved, all that's needed is an idea and some energy. There are admittedly some potential complications; the barn is not owned by the village so everything we do has to be with the permission of the owners and there is sometimes a bit of tedious admin to do. But the barn team are used to that and can provide help and guidance given sufficient notice.

One aspect that we all want to see improved is the local history exhibition. It was created by the original team of village history researchers in 1991 and has been rearranged and added to several times since with the benefit of new research, which continues today. But we know it has become a bit stale and static and is now overdue for an upgrade. We are ready for that, but to achieve it we would really like people to tell us what they want to see and ideally get some help to do it. We also have an idea to convert the permanent display boards into a multi-purpose flexible exhibition space that can easily host short-term exhibitions and be capable of a rapid changeover alternating with the permanent local history exhibition. We already have a local photographic group who would like to use it next year for a photo exhibition, perhaps coinciding with Oxfordshire Artweeks.

FUTURE EVENTS

There are a number of other future events already in the planning phase.

On Thursday 1st August there will be a Family Day at the barn with tea and cake and some items from the museum collections that children – of all ages! – can handle.

On Wednesday 21st August there will be an Archaeology Day. Ed Caswell, Oxfordshire's Portable Antiquities Scheme officer, will be on hand to examine and help identify items of historical interest that people have found. Local detectorists will be very welcome to bring their finds. Many interesting finds from Swalcliffe Archaeological excavations will also be on display. Tea and coffee will be free-flowing as well, so this should make an interesting day.

On Saturday 5th October there will be a Volunteer Recruitment day and anyone interested or willing to join our team of volunteer Barn stewards will be most welcome to come and find out what it involves. Tea and coffee will be available too, so do come and have a chat.

Future Community Events: There are none planned at the moment, other than those listed above, but what events would you like to see happen? And would you be willing to help organise one? The barn team has experience in working with the Museum Service to enable community events to take place and will support any person or group that wants to organise one.


IDEAS FOR THE FUTURE





WHY DO WILDER GARDENS MATTER AND HOW CAN YOU GET ONE

Gardens in Britain cover and area more than twice the size of national nature reserves. Collectively they offer a vital lifeline that could boost wildlife and improve the natural environment. One of the great debates amongst horticulturalists is the extent to which taking a more natural approach and gardening with wildlife in mind, is pitched against the traditional desire to keep things neat and tidy. Even rewilding a little area of each garden could help to aid local wildlife and support nature recovery. If you want to get involved, some simple ideas are shown below.

Don't mow the grass so often and not at all during May – the grasses and flowers that flourish across the year will offer birds and inspects a variety of food otherwise not able to grow.

Let things rot and decay where they are – decaying plants provide shelter for insects and nourish the soil. If that sounds too radical, pile up the logs, leaves, and branches somewhere discreet to create a habitat for insects and wildlife to thrive.

Go chemical free – chuck out the pesticides, herbicides, chemical fertilisers, the soil will thank you for it as much as the local wildlife and waterways. There are plenty of organic alternatives, including making your own compost.

Plant with wildlife in mind – select a range of plants that provide food all year around for wildlife and create natural shelters in which they can live. Find a corner for some wildflowers, the best time to plant is March to April and they'll bloom 60-80 days later.

Become more weed tolerant – we might have been trained to think that weeds are bad, but they are an invaluable source of food and habitat for wildlife, especially birds and insects.

Encourage native trees and don't be too keen to crop them back – *Native tress have evolved alongside each other for centuries to form a mixture that benefits different species, providing food, shelter, and a place to raise young.*

Support soil recovery – healthy soil supports biodiversity. Keep it organic, peat-free, and even make your own compost to enhance it. Don't dig around too much either, let the worms that thrive through a more natural approach do that for you.

Encourage wildlife – creating watery habitats such as tub ponds, installing nesting sites or putting up bug hotels, bird boxes and bat boxes all help to enhance further the more natural approach to gardening.

Be open to visitors from further afield – create small gaps in fence lines or natural routes along which animals that prefer to travel can roam. For example, hedgehog highways.


We did so well, and showed it can be done during the Covid lockdowns, and although our lives have moved on, a lot of them have not had that opportunity.
