25th Annual Tadmarton Charity Fun Ride – Sunday 22nd August

Having had weather warnings of torrential rain, high winds and thunderstorms, we were holding our breath for better weather – fortunately the inclement weather went through the day before – not so good for those of us putting the marquee up the evening before!

Our 10 mile route this year started at Swalcliffe Park Equestrian, meandered its way over to Traitor's Ford, up Ditch Edge, along Begger's Lane, over a few footpaths, (thank you to The Epwell Trust, Basil Page and the Prickett family especially Nigel for moving the donkeys!) to the Chandler's Arms at Epwell where a few drinks were had! Onward over the bridlepaths that cross Chillaway, Blenheim and Brakelands Farms and back to Swalcliffe for a spin around the Cross-Country course. There was a shorter route branching off from Ditch Edge, through Sibford and back to Swalcliffe Park Equestrian.

The day ran exceptionally smoothly, sadly numbers were slightly down on previous years, however, those that did the ride were extremely happy and commented how lucky we are to live in such a beautiful part of the country, with such amazing riding.

After expenses, we have been able to send £1500 to each of our charities, namely Thames Valley Air Ambulance and Frank Wise School. We have now raised over £74,000 in total over the past 25 years.

Many thanks to the farmers and land owners who allow us to cross their land that is not usually ridden; this also makes the ride extra special for our local participants. We're so grateful to those who moved their stock, it is much appreciated; it enables us to leave the gates open which makes the ride all the more enjoyable and also means we need less volunteers. This year's ride had 31 gates and all bar two were able to be left open!

As always, a special thank you to Swalcliffe Park Equestrian for the ongoing use of their Cross-Country course.

Thank you to Josh & Daisy for the tables and chairs, also Geoff and Lyn for tables and catering equipment and anyone else who helped in any way.

My own personal thanks must go the liveries and friends at High Meadow Livery, whether they rode the ride, marshalled, donated or baked a cake. The ride would not happen without them. Special thanks to Nicky who again took a week off work to waymark the route with me.

GRANGE FARM, A ROMAN CROSSROADS

If we leave Swalcliffe village and travel South along Park Lane, we will soon find ourselves at what appears to be a T-junction where Park Lane meets Grange Lane, with the Grange Farm farmhouse in front of us. However, looking to the left of the farmhouse, we will see that the road continues past Grange Farm, down to the Common and Bacon Farm, and on towards Hook Norton and beyond. We are not at a T-junction, but a crossroads of great antiquity. One of the two roads that cross here is known to be a Roman-engineered road and the other is almost certainly a very ancient trackway that was subsequently adopted by the Romans.

First of all let's think about what we mean by "Roman road". The phrase easily invokes thoughts of the long, straight military roads that cross the country with a real sense of purpose. Most of these straight roads were completely new, built by the Romans early in their occupation. Swalcliffe is right at the centre of a triangle of such roads with the Fosseway to the West, Akeman Street to the South and Watling Street to the East. These join the major Roman towns of Corinium (Cirencester), Venonis (Towcester) and Verulamium (St Albans), often with intermediate forts and settlements (e.g. Chesterton). These roads were part of an extensive network of military, trade and supply routes supporting the Roman military occupation.

But minor roads were important too. The Roman settlement at Swalcliffe Lea appears to have been initially one of residential and farming use, rather than a military site, but evolved later into one of industry. It too required access and transport and was served by a network of local roads, many of which are traceable or even still in use today. These roads rarely run dead-straight like the military roads, but cross the landscape in a curving though purposeful way and Swalcliffe is surrounded by a network of such ancient minor roads.

Interest in tracing Roman roads began in the "antiquarian" era and research continues strongly today aided by modern remote sensing methods. In recent times our understanding of Roman roads in this region was improved considerably using a diverse mixture of historical sources, not least Anglo-Saxon charters, Roman "itineraries", and numerous site visits. Of particular interest are I.D. Margary's seminal work published in 1955 [FN1] with a 3rd edition in 1973 and Mrs. V. Wickham-Steed's study of Roman roads in the Banbury area published in 1964 [FN2].

Margary identified a Roman road going North from Swalcliffe, naming it M561, and described its route to Warmington which "shows evidence of skilful planning in face of difficult country, with turns to suit the ground" [FN3]. Wickham Steed [FN2] identified its route South of Swalcliffe thus "Another entirely engineered road takes a short cut from Over Norton to Warmington, going by Hook Norton, Nill Farm, Swalcliffe Grange (where it is 10 foot wide), Swalcliffe Park, Shutford, Balscot, Hornton (where it is pack-horse width) and, at the edge of the hill beyond, it takes a sharp turn and goes straight to Warmington. The curious curves and angles are evidence of skilful planning across difficult country". This road is of particular interest because it approaches Swalcliffe past Bacon Farm and the Common, via a ford crossing a tributary of the River Stour, to meet the crossroads at Grange Farm. It then continues along Park Lane into Swalcliffe Park and appears to go straight through the centre of the village, leaving it by Green Lane.

The road that it crosses at Grange Farm is another Roman road coming from Wigginton on Tadmarton Heath via the "prairie" and Stour Well, passing by Swalcliffe as Grange Lane, but this route is very obviously much older than the Romans. Wickham Steed described the route South of Swalcliffe in terms of networks of ancient "ridgeways" on the high ridges to the South of Swalcliffe now referred to generally as The Jurassic Way and another network of ancient ways in the same general direction known as The Port Way. Together these represent very ancient North-South trade routes. From the main ridge to the South of Swalcliffe there are numerous branch ridges carrying trackways. These join other ridges, sometimes crossing river valleys via easy river fords, and one these branch roads passes through Swalcliffe as Grange Lane. North of Swalcliffe this road crosses the Turnpike at Tyne Hill going to Edgehill whence it curves round by Nadbury Camp to descend by Hanwell, Drayton and Crouch Hill to Twyford and Nell Bridge. The whole of this route still has roads or trackways on it.




FIGURE 1: 1833 OS Map (Author's collection) showing main Roman roads

Studying old maps can provide clues to the routes of these old routes, and the 1833 Ordnance Survey map of Banbury and Swalcliffe (Figure 1) is no exception since it shows both of the Roman routes just described. It has long been known that the main roads through Swalcliffe have been significantly altered over time and this took place in three main phases.




FIGURE 2: R. Godson's road map of 1772 (Swalcliffe Archive SBE-0192)

The first phase of road reorganization is shown in a map drawn by R.Godson in 1772 (Figure 2) and shows between the letters A (at Park Lane) and B (at The Square) "the Old Road through the town and now purposed to be stopp'd up". It also shows between letters C and C at the top end of Park Lane the land given in lieu for it to be widened as a replacement route. This rearrangement was at the behest of Mr William Humphrey Wykham who, having rebuilt the house at Swalcliffe Park and turned it round to face southwards over the park, found the existence of the main road just below the house to be a dreadful inconvenience.

The old route of the main road came up Park Lane and turned into Swalcliffe Park where there is still a kink in the road close to Home Farm (A). It then crossed Swalcliffe Park below the house and continued into the village via The Square (B), past Street Farm (Now Sparrow Hall) and the pub where it reached the Village Green. A remnant of this route across Swalcliffe Park is shown in the 1833 OS Map (Figure 3), although that map may not be entirely accurate regarding the exact route as it omits the lake that we know was in existence by 1795.

The second phase was the creation of the Banbury to Shipston turnpike in 1802 [FN4] which improved the main road through Swalcliffe which we know today as the B4035.


The third rearrangement affected the route of Green Lane and was made by the Reverend Payne. Having taken up his position as Vicar of Swalcliffe in 1837, he found that the old vicarage on the main road opposite Manor Cottage (see Figure 2) was little more than a hovel which he was unwilling to impose upon his wife. Instead, he built the new vicarage we know today as Church House. At that time, Green Lane did not come straight up to join the Turnpike where the Village Hall is today, but took a different route on higher ground through part of what became the garden of the Vicarage, behind where are now The Bank and Schoolhouse. From there it came down what is now the drive of the Schoolhouse, across The Green to join

The Square. This route is clearly shown on the 1833 OS Map (Figure 3) and is most likely the route of the engineered Roman road M561.

Having built his lovely new Vicarage, Revd. Payne provided it with a new driveway made through a deep stone cutting to join the turnpike alongside Stratford Lodge. This severed the old route of Green Lane and its Roman road which he then re-routed to come straight up through what was previously the village stone quarry to the main road, thereby creating the route we know today.

This had several advantages: firstly, Payne was no longer inconvenienced by a main road through his new garden; secondly, it eliminated a particularly steep bit of road at the top of Green Lane, to the benefit of all; and thirdly it made room for improved



housing and a school. Having closed the old road, he demolished the old hovels on the main road, replacing them with The Bank, and built the Schoolhouse, thereby creating the road layout and buildings we know today. As a consequence of this, the occupants of The Bank, complaining that digging in their gardens always turns up huge amounts of stone, might actually be digging up the remnants of a Roman road!!

The 1833 map (Figure 1) shows us that the Roman road M561, having continued down Green Lane, did not turn right at the bottom towards the mill and Lower Lea as the present road does, but went northwards up what is still a farm track, crossing another Roman road going East-West across the Lea at yet another Roman Crossroads. It then passed to the West of Madmarston Hill and onwards via Shutford to Warmington. The road it crosses on the Lea is well known as a Roman road but perhaps its importance is not fully appreciated. Margery knew it as M56a, in places it is 21 feet wide, equal to the Fossseway, and it continues Eastwards to link with the newly discovered huge Roman Villa at Broughton, now the subject of a Time Team dig. Numerous minor Roman roads cross and serve Swalcliffe Lea which helps to explain the development of so large a Roman settlement here. This area is beginning to seem like an important place in Roman times.

The children have settled quickly into the new term, whether their teachers are familiar or knew to them, and school feels a very happy place to be.



Dear friends,

The above opening of Robert Frosts poem, simply titled 'October', captures the essence of the changing season that we are about to embark upon. October is a time of change, as we travel towards the 30th October when Summer time ends and we put back our clocks an hour. Gone will be the days of long summer evenings as the night draws in. It also is a time when I have to remember to get my torch out, especially after the evening services and events in church. I've also become ever more aware of the thousands of leaves on the Sycamore tree directly opposite me here at the Rectory, knowing full well that autumn will also bring with it for me, a sweeping brush and lots of days of leaf collecting.

It was another poet, Emily Dickinson, who reflected upon time in her famous poem 'Forever is composed of nows,' in which it's suggested she presents the idea that every small moment is happening now and collectively adds up to 'forever' or a lifetime. When we think about time it might seem so intangible, almost impossible to define and yet the journey of our lives is being created out of the experiences that we have.

October and the beginning of November have been times, that across the generations, has been used to reflect and remember maybe not only those whom we continue to love but see no more, but also as well as of course those whom we remember on Remembrance Sunday on the 14th November.

As a Christian, when I think about the vastness of the concept of time, I'm always drawn to what is written in the second letter of Peter 3 v8 where it says;

But do not forget this one thing, dear friends:

With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day.

So as we journey in our lives through time and the changing season of Autumn, let us individually and together not only be aware of the moments of the here and 'now' but also how they are formed together to build our lifetimes together in our villages and communities.


